District 7450 will promote Rotary at Philadelphia Airport thanks to RI grant

Rotary District 7450 has received a highly competitive public relations grant from Rotary International. The \$6000 award from Rotary International will be used along with \$2000 of District 7450 funds for an unprecedented five-month advertising campaign at Philadelphia International Airport.

"This is a tremendous initiative to get out the message of what Rotary is all about," says Russ deFuria, District Governor of District 7450. "We are going to have two 'state of the art' displays about Rotary in the fifth busiest flight gateway of the United States. More than two million passengers pass through the Philadelphia Airport each month and the latest surveys indicate that 8 of 10 frequent flyers read the messages around the airport. Each of the messages will be a wonderful tribute to what Rotary does and hopefully will recruit new members to our cause. We are breaking new ground here and we will learn from the experience, but whatever happens, this is a great opportunity to tell the Rotary story thanks to Rotary International," according to

deFuria.

"Our plan is to use two different lighted and full color 43" by 62" billboard graphics called dioramas that will displayed in the terminal areas," explains Joe Batory of the Rotary Club of Philadelphia who designed the ads using Rotary International "Humanity in Motion" themes and materials. "We will have some explanatory copy on each eye level diorama that will welcome the airport passengers to the 54 clubs of District 7450, tell them a bit about what Rotary does, and invite interested persons join a Rotary Club."

The diorama advertisements are expected to be up and running by February 1, and will run until June 30.

Rotary International had challenged Districts to come up with creative advertising campaigns and is allocating funding for topnotch public relations ideas aimed at improving the awareness and understanding of Rotary in the general community, inspiring current members, and attracting new ones.

Rotaractors invited to Leadership Institute

Leadership development is one of the core principles at the center of the Rotaract program. So it was just natural that several of the leaders of the Main Line Rotaract Club asked the District 7450 Rotaract Committee to organize a session of leadership training for Rotaractors.

As a result, the First Rotaract Leadership Institute will take place Saturday, February 9 when Rotaractors from the eight Rotaract Clubs in District 7450 will gather at Boy Scout Headquarters at 22nd and Winter Streets, Philadelphia, for interactive dialogue that will help them build their leadership skills.

The training will take place from 10:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., and begins with a continental breakfast when the Rotaractors will have a chance to meet and greet each other.

The day will be broken down into sessions focused on:

- Leading in life and in Rotaract, including building a better Rotaract team and club.
- Learning about new service projects and fund-raising ideas, and putting the fun into Rotaract.
- Discovering innovative membership recruitment tactics.

- Deciding how Rotaractors want to interact with each other in the district.

Past District Governor and Current District Leadership Trainer Bob Lankin is organizing the day, and Rotarians will facilitate the discussions. At 2 p.m. and 3 p.m. there will be sessions for Rotarians, one entitled "How to Start a Rotaract Club" and the other is "How to Work with Your Rotaract Club." Rotarians will receive a handout created in District 7450 entitled "So, You Want to Start a Rotaract Club in District 7450."

Rotaractors from neighboring districts have been invited to attend. The registration fee of \$5 to help defray the cost of the event is payable at the door.

18 Rotarians sought for February NID trip to Nigeria

South Brunswick Maine Rotarian Ann Lee Hussey and PDG Dave Groner of Dowagiac Michigan Rotary Club invite Rotarians to join them on the scheduled National Polio Immunization Days in Kano, Nigeria February 23 to 26. A hoped for 18 team members will leave Detroit February 17 for Nigeria.

Plans are to immunize in Kano and Kaduna States within District 9120 which still harbors 90 percent of the polio cases in Nigeria The team will be working closely with DG Saliu Ahmed of District 9120 though an "Adopt a Village" concept.

Adopt a Village is designed to help build confidence in the communities to show that Rotary does indeed care about their community as a whole and will demonstrate that the efforts to eradicate polio are borne out of this care. The team also will help people by providing malaria nets, clean water and sanitation facilities, educational needs, rehabilitation needs for polio survivors and more to create change faster when focused in one area. Provisional West Chester Rotary Club debuts

Borrowing a tradition from the Rotary Club of San Diego Uptown, a brand new provisional Rotary Club kicked off its first meeting by banging a spoon on a big pot in West Chester January 4.

Carol Metzker shared greetings from a past president of the California Rotary Club and the story that the pot they rang in lieu of a Rotary bell became such a cherished possession that the club eventually soldered a Rotary wheel on it and has used it since its own inaugural meeting years ago.

Forty persons, including prospective members, founding members and Rotarians from more than one-half dozen Rotary Clubs gathered at Pietro's Prime restaurant in West Chester the first Friday in January to kick off the club.

The Provisional Rotary Club is the first in District 7450 to meet at a time not associated with a meal and the first in West Chester to meet on Fridays. It hopes

District Conference Committee needs help from Rotarians to make weekend a success

Dear Fellow Rotarians:

As you know, the first Multi-District Conference at Skytop Lodge is fast approaching. The Conference is a great occasion for you to exchange ideas with other Rotarians. Members of District 7450 and District 7430 will journey together with renewed inspiration and fresh ideas for the development of new Club initiatives. This is an exciting time to be a member of Rotary, so I hope you will attend the Conference. Envision the possibilities!

We need your financial support to make this undertaking successful. The District Conference is supported only through the generosity of sponsors. Therefore, a Sponsor Book will be published and distributed to each Rotarian in attendance. If you place your advertisement with the Conference Board by March 1, 2007, the advertisement will also be included in the Conference Program. Additionally, your advertisement will be posted on the internet for all members of District 7450 to see. The cost of a full page advertisement is \$500. There are no restrictions as to what may be done with your full page advertisement and you may share the page with other Rotarians to advertise several businesses. This is a great opportunity to promote your business.

There will also be a 50/50 Raffle. Each ticket will cost \$200 and there will be 108 tickets printed. Each ticket holder has the opportunity to win \$10,800! The Raffle tickets may be purchased by either a District 7450 Club or an individual Club member (or group of Club members) and there are no restrictions as to how many tickets may be bought by a Club or individual. The purchase of a ticket not only supports the District Conference, but allows you to get a potential windfall of \$10,800! If all tickets are not sold, the cash prize will be based on the number of tickets sold multiplied by \$200 with the product divided by two.

Finally, we have six (6) hospitality suites available for the conference. Hospitality suites may be purchased for use by either a District

7450 Club or individual sponsor. Hospitality Suites will cost \$425 for one (1) night or \$750 for the conference weekend. The purchase of a Hospitality Suite is in addition to the Conference Registration Fee since there is no sleeping arrangement or meal package included with Hospitality Suites. There will be a curfew imposed on the Suites at 1am. This is a great opportunity for you to showcase your Club or for an individual to provide refreshments to other Rotarians on behalf of your business.

Additionally, there will be a Golf Tournament on Friday, April 25 beginning at 10 am. There will be a separate fee for the Tournament to include paying for greens fees, awards and lunch. This is a rare opportunity to experience one of America's premiere golf courses that was rated a 4.5 in Golf Digest's Best Places to Play. The course from the back tees measures 6,656 yards with a slope rating of 133, and forward tees 5,789, and is sloped at a 122 rating. Registration brochures regarding the Golf Tournament are forthcoming.

We are also planning both adult and children's activities for all days of the Conference including Nature Hikes, Hay Rides, Lawn Games, Mini Golf, Ping Pong and Movies through out the weekend. We will have Registration brochures for these events in the near future.

Our district is very fortunate to have a lot of youth-related activities. You will have the chance to hear more about Early Act for elementary age kids, Rotaract for young people


