District 7450 Conference slated during cruise to Bermuda May 8 to 13

Rotarians who register for the 5-day, 6-night Bermuda cruise District Conference May 8 to 13, 2010 by September 15 will be entered in a drawing for a free cruise.

DG Al Marland has arranged the unique conference cruise on the Royal Caribbean's "Explorer of the Seas" with a noon boarding time at Cape Liberty in Bayonne, N.J. Saturday, May 8.

Plans call for arrival in Bermuda's King's Wharf at 9 a.m. Monday, May 10. The cruise will depart Bermuda the next day at 5 p.m. for the scheduled return to Cape Liberty at 7 a.m. Thursday, May 13. Optional transportation to cruise terminal will be available.

In addition to the usual conference meetings, special events and a Governor's Luncheon Banquet, the cruise will feature on-ship miniature golf, rock climbing, casino, pool, children's pool and activities, health and fitness center, evening entertainment each night, and a private cocktail party for Rotarians and guests.

The cruise package includes breakfast, lunch, dinner and all snacks, all port taxes and government fees, and all gratuities for ship personnel.

Opportunities will be available to sign up for shore excursions on the island.


A reduced fee is offered for registrations received by October 1, 2009. Deadline for payment in full for the cruise is December 15, 2009.

We could not have produced a newsletter like this one without her expertise as an editor of a newspaper in her previous life.



District 7450’s first pitch for polio eradication funds in the new Rotary year came on July 21 with, quite literally, a first pitch. Wearing a t-shirt emblazoned with the “END POLIO NOW” logo, DG Al Marland threw the first pitch of the Phillies-Cubs baseball game at Citizens Bank Park.




Jumbotron at Citizens Bank Park displays the “END POLIO NOW” logo at Rotary Night at the Phillies.

The video was designed to raise spectators’ awareness that polio still exists and that Rotarians are working to eradicate it. It also made the pitch, “Text POLIO to

90999,” asking them to donate \$5 to The Rotary Foundation to help end polio by sending the 5-letter text message to 90999 from their cell phones.

The Guest Services kiosk at Citizens Bank Park also distributed “END POLIO NOW” flyers instructing readers how to donate via their cell phones.

District Membership Committee offers help to Rotary Clubs to recruit, retain members

Is your club experiencing the following dilemma?

"We lose Rotarians every day through death or sickness, relocation, job conflict or perhaps boredom and discontent with our club."

If your club is making this statement don't despair, you may need to discuss your club's special circumstances with your District Membership Committee, your club's Area Membership Coordinator, and your club's Assistant Governor.

Your District 7450 Leadership Team, led by Governor Al, is available to meet with your Rotary Club's Leadership Team to review and discuss your membership retention and recruiting concerns.

Rotary International has provided the District with a statistical report covering the last five Rotary years. This report reflects the membership change in each of our District's 54 clubs. We looked at the high and low membership points for each club over this five-year period, as compared to July 2009.

The conclusion is that our 54 clubs are showing mixed results, 12 clubs or 24 percent are showing membership growth; 37 clubs or 72 percent are showing membership contraction; and two clubs or 4 percent have maintained constant membership. These numbers do not include our three new Extension clubs, which were formed during this five-year period.

Overall, during the period July 2005 to July 2009, including our new clubs' membership growth, our aggregate 54 District clubs are experiencing a net contraction of 24 Rotarians or 1.2 percent reduction in membership. However, each Rotary Club should focus on its own membership condition.

There are two basic ways to grow membership: Retention and Recruitment. Each is equally important to the health of your Rotary Club.

Rotary Clubs can consider the following few basic questions:

- Do we show unified enthusiasm about what

we do in Rotary?

- Is our club's internal dynamics seen as positive by our members, and by those persons we ask to visit and to join our clubs?

- How do we show our appreciation to our current membership to encourage their continued high enthusiasm and future involvement?

To establish your club's positive membership direction, ask the following:

- Does your club have a membership action plan? If it does, that is a great start!

- How current is the plan, and have all Club Rotarians taken ownership?

Has the plan been implemented and results monitored and positively redirected as needed?

If a plan does not exist, it may be critical to the long-range health of your club to consider this important first step toward membership improvement. It is amazing what a united team of Rotarians can accomplish. Please leave old excuses behind and unite together and journey into your club's future.

Your club's leadership team can begin a self-analysis by searching many resources, including many helpful RI booklets that all presidents received during their President-Elect Training. Valuable data also is available on the web; enter **rotary membership retention** into your Google browser or visit RI's web site at www.rotary.org.

You will very quickly discover an array of helpful aids that other Rotary Clubs in North America and around the world have discovered or created. You will also see that clubs are diligently working to find educational material for their own customized solutions.

Do not be frustrated. Do not be left behind. There is help available; **just ask!**


Longwood Rotary Club presents 11 Paul Harris Fellow awards
