We expended every cent of our Rotary Foundation fund available to us this year to support our local and international projects – showing our Clubs’ high level of commitment to leveraging funds to help others here and abroad.



## Rotarians, Interactors complete 'Peace Wall' painting project



Media Rotarians and Interactors from Penncrest High School painted a new rendering of the message of "Peace" on the refurbished "Peace Wall" at the intersection of Chapel Hill, Bishop Hollow, and Ridley Creek Roads in Upper Providence Township April 30. The Interact Club, decided a year ago to refurbish the "Peace Wall" which has become a local landmark since the message of peace was painted on the wall over 10 years ago. The wall is a remnant of an historic building which once stood at the site.

The Interact Club obtained approval from Ridley Creek State Park and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania on whose ground the wall is located, and prepared a new design for the wall.

Williamson School was enlisted to complete the resurfacing of the wall to ensure it would be ready for a new mural. Matt McKay of McKay Painting donated the paint and labor to prep the wall for the mural.
