Rotary Night at the Union: 'End Polio Now' to benefit from ticket sale for Sept. 14 soccer game

District 7450 'End Polio Now' Committee plans to sell 200 tickets for the September 14 major league soccer game at PPL Stadium in Chester to raise funds for polio eradication.

Tickets are \$30 per person of which \$10 will be contributed to the "End Polio Now" Fund of the District.

Rotarians who sell/purchase tickets will receive \$10 credit per ticket for their Club's "End Polio Now" Fund.

Fellowship will begin at 5 p.m. with a complimentary tailgate party on the grassy knoll adjacent to the stadium and overlooking the magnificent Delaware River.

Once again, the Rotary Club of Chester is hosting the tailgate party before the 7:30 p.m. game in which Philadelphia Union will play the Houston Dynamos.

It's the only Union home game during September. Rotarians are encouraged to bring your younger soccer players to see how they do it in the majors while they are playing fall soccer.

At District Installation dinner

RI honors two with special recognition awards

During the June 30th installation dinner, outgoing DG Dave Ellis presented two special recognition awards from Rotary International.

One of the awards was "Non Rotarian Spouse of a Rotarian," a special award given to individuals who have contributed to Rotary without being a Rotarian, was presented to Joanne Gillespie, wife of John Gillespie of the Central Chester County Rotary Club.

Presented by RI and signed by the RI president, this award is given to a maximum of 100 persons worldwide.

Joanne, a registered nurse, has been very active in Rotaplast as a volunteer nurse. In a nominating letter, District Rotaplast chairman Don Heebner wrote, "I have been on four Rotaplast missions with Joanne Gillespie. In every sense of the meaning Joanne Gillespie exemplifies the ideals of Rotary.

Medically, I have heard Rotaplast described as the gold standard of cleft lip and palate missions. Rotaplast has earned this reputation by maintaining rigorous standards, and thoroughly vetting the credentials of their medical volunteers prior to considering them for service in a Rotaplast mission. Joanne has met these standards and been welcomed back for a total of 15 missions.



"Many of our patients have never been to a doctor let alone been in a hospital where everyone is dressed in scrubs and wearing masks. Joanne's professionalism, warm smile, compassion bridges any language or culture barrier and brings comfort to the children and families.

"Travel to the location can be as long as 40 continuous hours across 12 time zones, with the only opportunity for sleep being on an airplane or bus. During a mission, the days can be as long as 15 hours, without enough sleep. In spite of conditions, I have never heard Joanne complain, lose her composure, or lose her poise."

The second special award, The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service, was presented to

Philadelphia Rotarian Joe Batory, who received his award at the Philadelphia Rotary Club July 18 meeting because he was out of town at the time of the installation dinner. The award is awarded to no more than one person per district per year.

Joe has served as Scholar chair for the District Rotary Foundation Committee for a number of years. He has welcomed all the inbound scholars, finding counselors for each one, and made them feel at home. Additionally, he has led the team that has selected a large number of successful outbound Ambassadorial and Peace Scholars. "Joe does all this with professionalism and personal care. No one could do a better job than Joe does," says iPDG Dave Ellis.

Joe has coordinated the process for seven Rotary scholarship winners who have gone overseas to study and 20 visiting Rotary scholarship recipients who have studied in the Philadelphia area.

"Being the scholarship chairperson for Rotary District 7450 has enabled me to meet a wide array of idealistic

and very intellectually talented young people," said Batory. "I have made many friendships for life but more importantly, I have been privileged to meet many young people who will truly change the world for the better in the future."

As the PR chair for the District, Joe designed and managed Philadelphia area Rotary billboard advertising via PR grants worth \$1 million over the past four years. He has also taught numerous public image seminars for Rotary leaders.

Joe has been a Rotarian for more than 25 years including 16 years in Upper Darby before

he transferred to the Rotary Club of Philadelphia. He is a past president of the Rotary Club of Philadelphia and led that club during its Centennial year celebration in 2010-2011. He is a retired educator, and was superintendent of schools for Upper Darby School District when he retired.

Joe has been a key player in the Philadelphia Rotary Club's literacy outreach into the inner city which in the last five years has involved the onsite distribution of well over 12,000 thesauruses, dictionaries, atlases and library books at 24 different Philadelphia public schools and continues to support the Computer Assisted Learning Solution to help struggling readers at the Stephen Girard School.



Business leaders named honorary Rotarians

Judith Curtin, (middle) a board certified doctor of audiology and interactive hearing solutions, and owner of ABC Hearing, and Richard May, owner of RKM Advisors, have been named Honorary Rotarians for 2013 by the Rotary Club of West Chester.

Curtin and May were honored for providing meritorious service in the furtherance of Rotary ideals and high ethical standards in business, community, personal life and internationally.

Curtin, who is also an American Hearing and Speech Association certified speech pathologist, has taught at West Chester University for over 12 years, and started a clinic at WCU to provide individuals 70 and older with free hearing tests. A primary mission of hers was the advancement of Cued Speech as a tool to teach spoken language to profoundly deaf children. She was one of the first to propose cochlear implants for infants and children, and a parent advocate for parents of profoundly deaf children in the Philadelphia School System.

A former sign instructor for the Academy of Rehabilitative Audiology, she facilitated communication with deaf persons in four languages. Recently she joined local healthcare providers on a trip to Honduras, where she established a program for testing hearing and providing hearing aids, and trained local technicians. In 2004, she and her husband opened ABC Hearing in West Chester. She is supportive of the West Chester Senior Center, Acts in Faith and Rotary.

Richard May, owner of RKM Advisors since 1980, helped found West Chester Library, Labor and Capital in 2007 to provide funding based on philanthropic ideals in support of entrepreneurial endeavors. The first loan from the organization helped the West Chester Library fund its recent, major renovation.

Committed to West Chester's growth and sustainability, he has held leadership roles in nonprofit organizations to improve and maintain the high quality of life in West Chester. May is a former board chair of the West Chester Business Improvement District, and on the board of the West Chester Downtown Foundation and the Investment Committee of the Chester County Community Foundation. He recently helped establish the Uptown Entertainment Alliance Board to bring a movie theater/entertainment center back to downtown West Chester.



Update from Lindsey Elkin

District 7450 Ambassadorial Scholar

Lindsey Elkin, Rotary District 7450 Ambassadorial Scholar, who is studying at the University of Cape Town in South Africa, has spoken at seven different Rotary Clubs and participated in a number of volunteer activities. She reports that on the recent birthday of Nelson Mandela, she was very honored to travel with her host counselor into Khayelitsha (the largest township in Cape Town) to paint murals.

"It is truly amazing how Mandela has united this entire 'rainbow nation'; his legacy is one of greatness" Lindsey points out. "I cannot believe I have been here for over six months! I feel like a true South African. Thanks so much to all Rotarians for making all of this possible. This has been the most meaningful experience of my life."

Lindsey is working on her dissertation, the thesis of which is an empirical comparative analysis of suicide bombers in Iraq, Afghanistan, and the Israeli Territories. Rotary International has phased out its Ambassadorial Scholarship program effective this year. More than 40,000 scholarships have been awarded over the years Rotary offered the program.

Global Grant winner to attend University of Peace in Costa Rica

Amanda is a magna cum laude graduate of Bryn Mawr College, fluent in Spanish, and committed to humanitarian purposes. She will begin her master’s degree program of study at the prestigious United Nations-chartered University of Peace in Costa Rica this August. She will study “Sustainable Economic and Community Development,” one of Rotary International’s targeted Future Vision areas. She hopes to apply what she learns to helping the poor and underserved in Latin America.

“Amanda is academically superior, bilingual, assertive and committed to making a difference for the better in our imperfect world,” according to Batory. “She has a track record of accomplishment working as a Fulbright Fellow with people in a cultural setting that is far different from her own.

Amanda is comfortable living and working in other countries and already has significant international experiences.

“Amanda is an impressive, well-spoken and intelligent young woman. Her depth of interest in egalitarian issues, international relations and environmental causes could lead her to any number of careers. She has enormous potential to become a great leader.

“Amanda’s total package intelligence, creativity, academic accomplishment, grit, exceptional people skills, and international experiences---leave no doubt about her qualifications and potential for great success.”

As part of the Global Grant scholarship process, contact has been established with the Rotary Club of San Jose in Costa Rica (Rotary District 4240) which has expressed the willingness to act as the host Club and provide hospitality for Amanda. This Rotary Club has successfully hosted several Rotary Scholars in the past.


