The **Project Partners Catalogue** lists organizations with which District 7450 Rotary clubs are already partnering and working to help their communities. If a club wants to work with a certain organization, they can look it up in the catalogue to find out if any other clubs currently work with it, as well. This provides opportunities for clubs working together toward a common goal to serve the community and broaden Rotary's impact through coordination of activities, such as on Rotarians At Work Day. 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

Rotary International Council on Legislation: April 14-18, 2019

PDG Bonnie Korengel of the Longwood Rotary Club was selected as District 7450's representative to the Council in 2017; a three-year term culminating in the 2019 Council on Legislation. Following is her report to the District.

During the recent five-day Council, 117 Enactments were proposed, debated and voted upon. These enactments were proposals to changes in the RI constitutional documents, such as the RI Constitution, the RI Bylaws and the Standard Rotary Club Constitution. Those enactments that passed will become effective July 1, 2019.

The voting delegates were representatives from each of the 538 RI districts. 80% of the representatives were first time Council attendees. We were asked to consider enactments not from the viewpoint of our own club but a more global perspective and fair to all.

We did pay attention when RI President Barry spoke passionately about elevating the status of Rotaract. The enactment admits Rotaract clubs to RI membership and defines Rotaract as a "club of young adults". The RI Constitution now states: ***"Rotary International is the association of clubs and***

Rotaract clubs throughout the world." Rotaract clubs are partners with Rotary clubs, and are a valued member of the Rotary Family.

One of the Enactments passed will add this sentence to the Bylaws: ***Each club shall endeavor to build a well-balanced membership that celebrates diversity.***

A progressive enactment passed by the 2016 Council on Legislation changed the weekly meeting attendance requirements and provided for more flexible types of clubs. These progressive steps were endorsed by the 2019 COL: We are not going backwards!

Another Enactment changed the Standard Club Constitution which stated that "the club president shall serve a period of one year or until a successor has been elected." This has been changed to: "When a successor has not been elected, the term of the current president shall be extended for one year only."






MEMBERSHIP MATTERS

District Literacy Awards Presented to Nine Clubs

More than 775 million people over the age of 15 are below standard literate. That's 17 percent of the world's adult population. Rotary is committed to strengthening the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce gender disparity in education, and increase adult literacy. Rotary District 7450 recognizes this need and created the District Literacy Award to identify clubs which have completed five or more literacy related activities in the Rotary year.

This year nine local clubs were recognized as literacy leaders at the April 13 District Assembly. DGE Peter Mardinly presented the awards. In total, the nine clubs completed 71 literacy related activities. The club with the most activities was the Rotary Club of Broomall, with 13 activities, a close second was the Rotary Club of Coatesville with 12. Among the exciting and innovative activities was the distribution of a backpack with three books to an entire first grade class in West Philadelphia (Broomall), donating musical instruments to support the education program in Haiti through "Mommy Sue's Children" (Frankford-Northeast), and cooperating with the Read2Dream Foundation to provide one book a month to low-income families (We-Go).

Clubs are encouraged to start planning their 2019-2020 literacy activities now. The award application form will be available in the fall.

District Bylaws are Amended and Revised

After ten months of meetings, research, reviews and more meetings, the District Bylaws Committee, chaired by PDG Joan Batory, amended the District Bylaws. It is now a streamlined and contemporary document that is more user friendly for the average Rotarian. Revision was a Herculean task that cleared years of clutter, neglect, and outdated provisions. The committee reviewed the bylaws of other districts and worked with Rotary headquarters to ensure the most up to date approaches to subjects and be in full compliance with RI bylaws. The committee recruited attorney David Adams to serve as parliamentarian. He provided an overview to make certain the bylaws followed PA State laws and used universally accepted practices.

The amended bylaws are now divided into two parts. The first part is titled *Bylaws* and addresses the organization of the District and duties of officers and board of directors. The second part is entitled *Guidelines* and addresses policies and procedures. The amended documents may be viewed and downloaded on the District Website ([CLICK HERE](#)). The amended and restated documents were unanimously approved by the district board of directors and sent to all clubs for their approval on May 23, 2019. Club presidents must approve or disapprove the amended bylaws by return ballot by June 24, 2019
