The District 7450 Rotaplast Committee's mission to Nepal in March was canceled due to travel uncertainties. It's a tragedy because so many children and families were hoping to receive corrective surgery for children with cleft lip and cleft palate. Nepal will be rescheduled for next year. Meanwhile, the committee is gearing up for an alternate mission in November to Luxor, Egypt.



Rotaplast missions are conducted at the request of Rotary clubs in 26 underdeveloped countries from Guatemala to Tanzania. District 7450 has conducted a mission every year for 21 years. Missions are funded by contributions from 90% of our clubs and personal donations. Each mission includes 10 Rotarians from District 7450 who accompany 20 volunteer medical personnel from as near as Philadelphia to as far as New Zealand.


The annual fundraiser at the Media Theatre for April 22nd has been postponed. A rain date will likely be in September/October when Mama Mia is available.

Side Bar – *Thinking about things that happen during major events, I just had to tell this story.....*

Did you ever hear of the Great New York City Blackout? Well, at the time my wife worked for Playtex on the 65th floor of the Empire State Building. She was just leaving work and waiting for the elevator when the lights went out. Good timing.

The building has only one stairwell from the ground to the 102nd floor. People could look down an open shaft with stairs winding around a 650-foot dead drop. The builders hadn't planned on a blackout and the stairwell had no safety lights. Total darkness.

At the time, Playtex was introducing several new products and had plenty of samples in the office. This was 1969 when most people smoked, and many kept cigarette lighter fluid in their desks. (Getting the picture?) The execs made small torches and led a cheerful parade all the way to the street. As the torches burned down they would toss them into the void and watch the flaming embers spiral hundreds of feet to the floor below. That's how they knew how far they had to go. Later, the execs handed out certificates entitled, "Order of the Golden Staircase."

Now that's a good story.

Best Practices for Holding Online Meetings

1. Familiarize yourself with a preferred online meeting platform ([Zoom](#), [GotoMeeting](#)) and host a test call prior to your first meeting
2. Provide one-on-one tutorials with less tech-savvy Rotarians on how to use the online meeting format
3. Provide an agenda prior to the meeting
4. Set up a communication/etiquette plan for holding online meetings
5. Requesting all attendees mute themselves when not speaking
6. “Raising hands” to avoid multiple people speaking at once
7. Pausing for questions
8. Using the chatbox feature
9. Recording your meeting for those unable to attend
10. Utilize [TED Talks](#), [Rotary’s VIMEO](#), and other pre-recorded speakers to watch online together and follow with a group discussion
11. Take the online courses at <https://learn.rotary.org/learn>
12. Select an article or short film to read/watch prior to meeting and discuss together
13. Determine the current needs of your community and promote an online service project/fundraiser



14. Review District 6690’s helpful guide to maintaining engagement with your club’s members through virtual meetings and other strategies at <https://rotary6690.org/maintaining-engagement/>
15. Get in contact with another club that is used to utilizing online technology such as an ‘e-club’ in order to discuss. Use the ‘E-Club’ section of the [Club Finder](#) on [rotary.org](#) or My Rotary. Alternatively contact your RMO for contact details.
