

"We were just unsure how it was all going to come together with such a robust schedule and so many attendees, but our team feels we accomplished what we set out to do." If what the three District Governors from 7390, 7430 and 7450 set out to do was provide a beneficial, unique, and memorable event, then they did accomplish that.

The conference included motivational presentations from keynote speakers Tracey Jones, RIDE Drew Kessler, and Alan Mallory, as well as a variety of breakout sessions. The breakouts were designed not only to inform attendees' experience as Rotarians, but to provide them with professional skill building and leadership training, as well.

Additionally, a virtual Hall of Friendship was available to visit between sessions and hosted 40 participants, including club projects, outreach committees, and Rotarian-owned businesses.

Of course, the weekend wasn't all about business. There was a trivia event, hosted by Philadelphia Quizzo host Sean P. Maguire on Friday night (which saw Rotarians from District 7450 win first, second, and third places). Saturday night was a Rotary Foundation Fundraiser event and included virtual Bingo in one room and a dueling magicians' performance by The Magic Duel in another.

It took a committee of Rotarians from all three districts months of planning and preparations to present this event, which gave attendees everything they could want in a Rotary conference -- and during a pandemic, too! Special kudos to those who worked to make the 2021 District Conference a success. Additional thanks to those Rotarians who shared their time in the Hall of Friendship or provided their knowledge to help other Rotarians in the breakout sessions.



"I always mention teamwork when I talk about my keys to leadership. The Rotary Foundation Report

We are approaching the end of this Rotary year and I want to thank all the Rotarians who made donations to the Rotary Foundation. To date we have given 127,000.00 to the annual fund. We are behind last year but we still have time to give to the annual fund which comes back to our district 3 years later. Please make your donation TODAY!

The district created the Lynmar Brock Challenge that will match your donation to the annual fund. If you give \$250 - \$1,000 we will match your donation. Example if you give \$500 we will match it and you will become a Paul Harris Fellow. Please send me the confirmation and we will match the donation in points. This Challenge will end June 15. Lynmar Brock who was a member of the Philadelphia and West Chester rotary club was a PDG and a past Rotary International Director.

We started the Rotary year with disaster relief grants from Rotary International for food banks. We gave \$25,000 to 8 clubs. This money came from the World Fund. In April we had two very successful grant training zoom sessions and qualified 30 clubs to apply for a district grant or global grant for the next Rotary year. In May, we recognized the Paul Harris Society members. Every year they give \$1,000 to the Rotary Foundation.


This year all district grants need to be applied for through the grant module in DACDB on the District website under Grants. The applications need to be submitted by June 6, 2021.

In June, we will have the chance to raise money for End Polio Now since our fundraising with the Phillies was not able to happen with the pandemic last July and we cannot do it again this July. Governor Kevin reached out to Locust Lane Brewery in Malvern and they will label one of their beers "Purple Pinkie". Stay tuned and you will hear how to order beer and raise money for Polio.

Lastly, I would like to recognize Vasanth Prabhu, from the Rotary club of Central Chester County who has become the newest member of the Arch Klumph Society and PDG Joan and Joe Batory from Rotary Club of Philadelphia for reaching the Bequest Society Level 5. Their money will be given to the Peace Fellow program. Thank you PDG Joan and Joe for your commitment.

Vasanth's commitment to the Rotary Foundation over many years has created funding for millions of dollars for global grants. Thank you Vasanth for all the amazing projects you have been involved in and making the world a better place.

In February 2022, we are hoping to have a face to face Rotary Foundation event to recognize all donors that have given to the Rotary Foundation.



Supporting The Environment

Rotary International announced the creation of a seventh area of focus to begin in July 2021 called *Supporting the Environment*. Its focus is to encourage club projects that protect the natural environment in our communities. The opportunities for Rotarians to do good in the world are limitless.



Our district has formed a *Supporting the Environment Committee* beginning July 1st. It will work with clubs to develop their own SE programs and projects. It will provide information, support, opportunities to work with other Rotary clubs and regional universities.

Our major ally and resource for information and ideas is the *Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group*, commonly known as ESRAG, www.esrag.org. Rotarians are encouraged to join or subscribe to its Newsletter that



publishes stories of Rotary projects throughout the world. Some topics: Local school environmental education or sustainability project, bird houses and bat houses, planting pollinator flowers, tree planting, domestic and commercial water conservation, river and stream conservation and purity, natural land preservation, clean air, waste management, reducing carbon footprint, energy conservation, recycling, eliminating harmful refrigerants such as chlorofluorocarbons.

RI President Holger Knaack challenged clubs around the world to tell stories of their successful *Environmental Sustainability* projects by submitting 70-100 second videos. So far, 2,326 clubs have submitted their entries. Only 7 of the best will be selected. Winners will be posted on June 5th, World Environment Day. Look for these inspiring projects. See www.ifixtheplanet.org.

Clubs are encouraged to conduct joint club projects for greater community impact. For example, clubs in District 7870, southern New Hampshire, convinced their school district to convert school buses from diesel to electric and construct a solar panel farm to power the buses. School buses are used only four hours a day for 180 days each year. The rest of the year they are linked together and store electricity which is sold to the local utility company. It is a brilliant idea that saves money and illustrates the value of Rotary in the community.



Although Supporting the Environment will become a standalone area of focus, over the past 5 years, more than \$18 million in Foundation global grant funding has been allocated to environment related projects. Past

The Rotary Foundation will be supporting activities that strengthen the conservation and protection of natural resources, advance environmental sustainability, and foster harmony among people and the environment. To do projects that have a larger impact, and broader reach, ongoing donations to the Rotary Foundation will be needed to permit Rotarians to plan and implement global grant projects. One way to assure that funds are there when we need/want them is to make gifts that are targeted towards supporting the environment via the world fund. The interest from these donations will then be directed only to global grants that are focused on this new area of focus into perpetuity. Consider being a donor leader in supporting this new area of focus.


The Gundaker Year



“Rotarians have an aversion to sitting around twiddling their thumbs. It’s not in our nature,” said Gundaker president Karen Mazzarella. And, as one might expect, the Gundaker year has been anything but quiet. We virtually visited thirty clubs to better tell our story to Rotarians who might have forgotten us over the years or are new to Rotary. As a result, contributions doubled, and three new clubs joined Gundaker. Remember, Gundaker is one of only two district foundations in the world.

We sought vocational students for our scholarship grants for the third time in as many years and provided five vocational scholarships. Our conversion to vocational grants has not gone unnoticed and several clubs

are now doing the same. The number of young women is about the same as young men in traditionally male roles reflecting the changes in our culture.



We opened an entirely new grant program to meet urgent community needs during the COVID-19 pandemic. The qualifications were extremely liberal, and payments were fast coming. It was called Great Grants and we were thrilled to see 39 clubs successfully seek 76 grants.

Last year we went virtual and saw an uptick in meeting attendance plus several new

faces. Overall communications with club members were expanded and improved and our website was vastly upgraded due to the work of PDG David Haradon. See for yourself, www.gundaker.org


Global Grant to India

The Covid-19 pandemic has impacted India especially hard. The Karnataka Institute of Medical Sciences in Hubli, Karnataka, western India, reached out to Rotary and other organizations to fund urgently needed equipment. This is the only government owned hospital in the region serving Carona-19 patients.

The Rotary Club of Central Chester County responded by initiating a Rotary Global Grant. It coordinated with other donors and the hospital received funds to purchase four critically needed ventilators. Since the arrival of the equipment on March 2, 2021, several lives have been saved and many more will be.



Painting By Numbers



Kenneth Square Light RC staged a unique Zoom event that left people with something pretty to show for it. And everyone had a great time doing it. Here's how it came about.

The club leadership gives all new members the assignment of creating and running an event. This spring, Steve Breinlinger used his artistic talent to develop a project that will ring familiar to people who watched *The Joy of Painting* by Bob Ross. Mr. Ross would paint a subject while he explained his work step by step so viewers could paint along with him. And that is just what Steve did. Well, not exactly. There is a lot more to the story.

First, Steve put together kits of art materials for people to create their own masterpieces. Each kit included paper, brushes, paints and more. These were sold for \$25 to friends and family. A matching kit was then donated to senior living centers.

The painting lesson, patterned on Bob Ross's model, took about an hour with lots of good natured entertainment by Steve and his audience. More art classes are planned by popular demand.


Mulching Along

However, on a Saturday morning, more than twice as many as expected showed up with spouses and children! With so many helpers, including park volunteers, the work was completed in record time this year. West Chester Rotarians are well known for involving their families in numerous community activities.



Public Image Committee's Year

At the start of the 2020-21 Rotary year, DG Kevin set goals for the Public Image committee and one of those goals was to get clubs to use Rotary's current branding and logos if they were not already doing so.

When he brought this goal to the committee, they used it to come up with more ideas for building brand awareness, which they have implemented throughout the Rotary year. Those have included:

- **The Sign Initiative:** This was DG Kevin's original idea and led to 18 clubs receiving reimbursement up to \$150 for updated signs, banners, yard signs, and even branded reflective vests for outdoor service.
- **Social media:** Social media posting on the District Facebook page has increased and the [Rotarians of District 7450 Facebook Group](#) continues to gain traction and allow Rotarians to share events, news, service projects, and more.
- **Digital billboards:** Committee member Lisa Leonard was able to negotiate with Outfront for the district's inclusion on 13 digital billboards, free of charge, for a full year (Nov. 2020 - Oct. 2021). Those billboards can be found on major roadways such as I-95, the PA Turnpike, Rt. 202, Rt. 1, and the Walt Whitman Bridge.
- **Public Image Resources Page:** Many Rotarians don't know how to use RI's Brand Center to get current logos and materials and end up using old branding found during a Google search. To combat this, the committee, along with help from Brian Casey, established a repository of PI resources, including media advisory and press release templates, a [Canva](#) guide, social media tips and tricks, and easy-to-access current logos and brand materials. - **Legacy Video Project:** This new project, working with former Media Rotarian Dan Lievans and his video production company, will recognize and feature various Rotarians telling their Rotary story and will establish a video library that could be used to share who we are and what we do.



I was excited about the attendance at the District Training Assembly, which our training team planned in June 2020. Most recently, I was completely overwhelmed by the number of attendees from our District at the Virtual Tri-District Conference, as well as the great participation for our District meeting that weekend. When I visited each of you at your meetings, I spoke of goals for the Rotary Year. 
