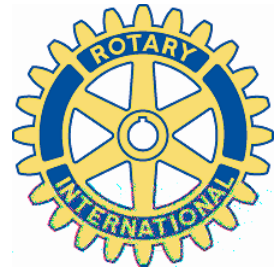

Central Chester County Rotarians help fund carpet-weaving training center in Afghanistan

The Rotary Club of Central Chester County has been working with the Rotary Club of Abaysin Central Peshawar, Pakistan, to provide carpet-weaving skill/job training in Afghanistan.

The carpet-weaving training center in Spinboldak, Kandahar, Afghanistan was officially opened October 22, 2007.

The center received 10 carpet-weaving frames and the wool for the carpets as result of Rotary sponsorship.

A total of 90 trainees have gone through the training process in the first six months and are now employed. All materials for the center were purchased in Pakistan and transported successfully by truck across the border to Spin-

boldak. Club of Abaysin Central Peshawar, near the border of Afghanistan.

The Rotary Club of Abaysin and District 3270 committed \$6000; Central Chester County Rotary Club provided \$2500, and District 7450 and Rotary Foundation provided \$6500 toward the \$15,000 project.

Spinboldak has about 10,000 households and the training is open to both male and female residents.

There is a high unemployment rate in Spinboldak due to the effects of war, according to Vasanth Prabhu, International Services chair of Central Chester County Rotary Club.

Kandahar province does not have its own Rotary Club; thus the area comes under the Pakistani Rotary

Ardmore Rotarians lead garden clean-up

With 35 ambitious volunteers, Ardmore Rotary Club led a major clean-up of the "Garden for the Blind and Children" in Wynnewood as well as the entire Wynnewood Valley Park and stream Saturday, March 22, .

Past president Doug Klepfer, chair of the restoration committee, reports, "Rotarians, Rotaractors and Interactors can always be counted on to provide 'Service above Self' beyond what is requested. In addition, the 'Men in Trees', Rotarian Steve Shreiner and his crew of six men from Shreiner Tree Service donated their services for two days to the restoration project."

Ardmore Rotarian Therese Trainer and her family and Bryn Mawr Trust Company provided lunch at mid-day Saturday.

In 1976, the Rotary Club of Ardmore and the Men's Garden Club of Delaware Valley, with the cooperation of Lower Merion Township, presented the community with "A Garden for the Blind and Children." Ardmore Rotary Club provided

funding for the construction of the multi-tiered garden surrounded by a flagstone patio with iron guide railings from the parking lot, over a brook to a hillside garden with plots marked by Braille plates to identify the individual flowers and scrubs. Rotarians provided initial costs of the plantings and undertook

the fall and spring garden preparations until continual maintenance was provided by the Men's Garden Club of Delaware Valley.

At the time the garden was dedicated in the spring of 1977, Ardmore Rotary Club and the United States received a gift of 25 cherry trees from the Rotary Club of Tokyo, Japan. They were sent in response to Ardmore Rotary Club's 1973 gift of 300

dogwood trees to replace dying trees sent in 1912 from United States for the Imperial Gardens.

In 2004-2005 Rotary year, Ardmore Rotarians, under leadership of then president Doug Klepfer, sent 100 pink and 100 white dogwood trees which have been planted in the Imperial Gardens and numerous locations throughout Tokyo as a Rotary Centennial Year project.

Today, 12 pink cherry trees remain over 45 feet high and bloom each year in early spring in the Garden for the Blind and Children. This year, Ardmore Rotary Club began working

with Lower Merion Township and local residents to restore the garden and make it handicapped accessible. Ardmore Rotary Club recently earmarked \$6,000 including \$2500 each from the Rotary Club and a donor and \$1000 from Gundaker Foundation.

We celebrate '20 Years of Women in Rotary'

This year we celebrate the fact that women have been in Rotary for 20 years! Prior to that, a member's wife known as a "Rotary Ann" might be involved, but would take a back seat to her husband. Now, thankfully, women are active members and leaders throughout our organization. According to the Rotary census, women account for 15 percent of international membership (22 percent in North America).

According to the Rotary website, "The addition of women in Rotary represents the single greatest force in the growth of Rotary International". In District 7450 this year, we have women serving as president in 19 out of 54 Rotary Clubs and six women are Assistant Governors and Lieutenant Governor.

PDG Sandy Costanzo was the first woman to serve as District 7450 Governor in 1999-2000 and in 2010-2011, District Governor Designated Joan Batory will be our second woman District Governor. Being a woman Rotarian, I am personally very excited about Joan becoming our District Governor and I know she will be well prepared to lead our District.

Prior to women being allowed in Rotary, they have always been a part of the Rotary scene. In 1923, in Manchester England, wives of Rotarians adopted the name of "Inner Wheel" for their auxiliary club. Inner Wheel clubs throughout the world concentrated upon friendship and personal service. To be a member of the Inner Wheel was a privilege that could only be enjoyed by the wife or widow of a Rotarian. The Inner Wheel continues to thrive in some European countries today.

In 1928, Rotary established the "Rotary Ann" auxiliary club. One of the purposes of Rotary Ann Club was to bring fellowship to the

families of the members of the Rotary Club. Most chapters met once a month, usually at the home of one of its members. These meetings were devoted to fellowship and to discuss the various projects of the Rotary Ann Club as well as offering assistance to their Rotarian spouses. Most Rotary Ann Clubs disappeared in the US in the late 1980s, as women finally became part of Rotary.

The first woman Rotarian was Sylvia Whitlock, who joined the Rotary Club of Duarte, California. The first class of women District Governors was 1995 including eight women

District Governors from the United States. Carolyn Jones from Anchorage, Alaska made history in 2005 when she became the first woman trustee of the Rotary Foundation.

In 2008, Rotary International will have its first woman director, Catherine Noyer-Riveau from District 1660. She is a member of the Rotary Club of Paris, France and will serve for two years.

The official policy of Rotary International prohibits the exclusion of women from membership, although in certain parts of the world it remains extremely rare to find a woman as a club member. I'm proud to say that isn't the case in our district!

We hope you can join us for lunch Saturday, May 3 at the Pyramid Club in Philadelphia to celebrate the accomplishments of "20 Years of Women in Rotary. We are very fortunate to have Philadelphia District Attorney Lynne Abraham as our keynote speaker. The cost for the event is \$45 per person. Reservation form is in this month's newsletter on page ?? Central Delco Rotary Club supports Blue Star Mothers Inc.

Marian L. Moran, president of the Philadelphia Chapter of Blue Star Mothers of America, recently spoke to the Rotary Club of Central Delaware County and received a donation from the Rotary Club for her work supporting our troops. The members of Blue Star Mothers are mothers who now have, or have had, children honorably serving in the military.



Army Capt. George H. Maines conceived the idea for the Blue Star Mothers in 1942. He ran a newspaper article in Flint, Michigan on January 22, 1942, requesting information about children serving in the Armed Forces. More than 1,000 mothers responded. By March 8, 1942, more than 600 mothers had organized the Blue Star Mothers of America, Inc.

During World War I, the blue star became gold if a service member was killed or died on active duty. The Gold Star Mothers of America, Inc. came from this group.
